A family built on love

hannon Stroup grew up in a big, happy family and always knew that she wanted one of her own. When she entered her 40's and still hadn't found the right man to marry and with whom to begin a life, she decided to go it alone. Her mother, Times-Picayune columnist Sheila Stroup, had received a news release from Catholic Charities Archdiocese of New Orleans announcing the opening of the adoption list and encouraged Shannon to apply.

"I didn't know what to expect," says Shannon. She feared that Catholic Charities might be more restrictive than other agencies and not open to a single woman adopting a child. Adoption Specialists Danna Cousins and Cindy Falgoust soon dispelled her worries. "They are angels. They said it wouldn't be a problem."

Time went by as Shannon waited for word that a baby was available. Finally, the long-awaited message came. There was a baby for her. After that, things moved quickly. She had just 24 hours to prepare for the arrival of 3-month-old Taliyah Cecilie, whom she quickly nicknamed Cilie.

"I enjoyed my childhood with my brother and sister and didn't want Cilie, who is now 3 years old, to be an only child. I started the ball rolling again after she turned 2." Devery Eli arrived a month or two after all of the paperwork was completed. "I thought Cilie was an easy baby until I had Devery," who is almost 9 months old. "He's just a really happy, easy-going baby." And, yes, Saints superstar Devery Henderson inspired his first name. "I didn't really have a boy's name picked out and I was reading the paper and thought, I like that!"

When Shannon looks at her two little ones, she doesn't see black or white; however, she sometimes gets puzzled looks as strangers try to figure out the relationship. And she readily admits, "There is a steep learning curve to doing a little black girl's hair!" Luckily, she has good friends who know exactly how to

make Cilie's locks look just right and mom is learning how to handle the job on her own.

Shannon, a veterinarian, enjoys the help and support of her family and friends. Although being a single mom is hectic, she has found her calling and vocation. "This is what I feel like I was meant to do. It's so worth it! Even when they're driving me crazy, it's so worth it!"

A lifetime of service and faith

loria and Raymond Lewis recently celebrated their 49th wedding anniversary. The celebration was bittersweet. Gloria is witness to the slow decline of her husband due to dementia. Mr. Lewis is a participant in Catholic Charities PACE (Program of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly). Mrs. Lewis says PACE not only provides excellent medical care for her husband, but it has also been a wonderful source of support and encouragement for her as his primary caregiver.

"In the caregivers' group, we all talk and through sharing, we help each other. You think your problem is big until you hear about someone else's problem. The support is such a tremendous help to me, "says Mrs. Lewis.

She and her husband met on the job at the old Charity Hospital, where both were employed, but throughout most of Mr. Lewis's working life, he was affiliated with ministries related to the Catholic Church. He spent many years working for the Sisters of the Holy Family at Lafon Nursing Home. He's a lifelong parishioner at Our Lady Star of the Sea Catholic Church and has long been active in music ministry there.

It was after Hurricane Katrina that Mrs. Lewis began noticing tell-tale signs that her husband's dementia was taking hold. Even though the disease is advancing, Mr. Lewis still attends Mass at Our Lady Star of the Sea every week and is the featured soloist at the liturgy. "Sometimes he forgets some of the words, but he's a good enough performer to overcome that," adds his wife.

As families of dementia patients can attest, caring for a loved one suffering

from this disease takes a toll. After three years in the PACE program, both Mr. Lewis and his family have received the support they needed to cope. Mrs. Lewis says their family is stronger because of it.

Family bowed, but not broken, by Isaac

eventy-six -year-old Marguerite Vega and her extended family have lived side-by-side in a pair of neat bungalows along the banks of the Mississippi River in Plaquemines Parish since 1943. The family has weathered many a storm in this hurricane-vulnerable area: Betsy, Camille, Georges, Katrina, Gustav, Ike and many more. Even the damage caused by big storms like Camille and Katrina did not compare to the damage caused by Hurricane Isaac in August of 2012. Water rushed in from the Gulf of Mexico and washed through the entire community on the east bank of the Mississippi. Many homes were completely moved off their foundations by the storm surge. The Vega family homes stayed in place, but the family's possessions were ruined.

Catholic Charities Operation Helping Hands (OHH) Program, which was a life-line for thousands of families after Hurricane Katrina, launched quickly in the weeks after Isaac. Mrs. Vega's home and her daughter's home were cleaned out by the work crews. Mrs. Vega, an accomplished needlepoint artist, was thrilled that the workers salvaged several of her prized works. "I think it's wonderful! I'm so thankful for Catholic Charities and the help I've received."







827 people assisted with employment placement through Community Staffing Services, Café Hope, Cornerstone Builders, Foster Grandparents, Hispanic Apostolate and Domestic Violence programs.

Faith provides a second chance

fter Hurricane Katrina, Operation Helping Hands was primarily staffed by volunteers. Some 30,000 people helped gut, rebuild and paint houses after that massive storm captured the nation's attention. Catholic Charities leaders knew that a different approach would be needed to help those, like Mrs. Vega, who were flooded by Isaac.

With an eye toward helping flooded families get back into their homes, while also helping another vulnerable group develop strong skills to strengthen their own families, OHH began gutting and cleaning out homes using members of Catholic Charities Cornerstone Builders and Community Staffing Services (CSS).

CSS, Catholic Charities' alternative staffing organization, provides jobs for hardto-employ clients while giving them the support they need to launch successful careers.

Cornerstone Builders is a ministry for formerly incarcerated people and provides good jobs and a new start for those determined to begin anew after serving jail time.

"For me, it feels great to be doing this and giving back," says Terry Holden (opposite page on right). "I've turned my life over to God and it feels good. I went from selling drugs to doing work to help people get back on their feet."

A Head Start for a family's future

hildren benefit from a solid, early childhood education program like Head Start. It's a fact. What may not be as well known is that families benefit from their children's Head Start experience as well. Aleagra Castro credits the program with helping stabilize and move her entire family forward. Aleagra's 4-year-old daughter, Sol, has attended El Yo Yo Bilingual Head Start since she was 6 weeks old. Her 11-year-old son was also a student at El Yo Yo. Her children got a great educational start here, but Aleagra also credits the program with helping her and her husband create a strong foundation for their whole family through couple's retreats, financial literacy classes and behavioral counseling.

Educated 1,789 people through Head Start, G.E.D., Café Hope, English as a Second Language, citizenship classes and after-school tutoring.

625 infants and toddlers got a "head start" in education through our 5 Head Start Centers. A 6th location was added in October, 2012. Served 1,241 with loving care and compassion through ACCESS Pregnancy and Referral Centers, Adoption Services and the St. Vincent Maternity Clinic. "It changed my life," says Aleagra. "Both of my children have minor disabilities. My daughter has a slight speech issue and my son was diagnosed with ADHD." She credits El Yo Yo director Gaynell Anderson with helping their family cope with her son's ADHD. "If she hadn't given us the tools we needed to learn how to adjust to this, my family would still be fraught with tension."



A family tradition....on four paws!

n 1956, Shirley Laussade began her life-long love affair with boxers. It began with Prince, who could water ski and was credited with saving several lives during his time. Today, Shirley continues to train and show world champion, certified pet therapy boxers. Cruiser is one of her superstars and a regular monthly visitor at Catholic Charities' Greenwalt Adult Day Health Center.


Shirley's mother attended Greenwalt for 15 years. During her mother's time at Greenwalt, Shirley began bringing her dogs there to interact with the elderly and infirm. She continues to do so even after her mother's death in 2005. The family connection that began as a service to her own mother continues to this day with the Greenwalt clients whom Shirley views as extended family.

"It makes me feel good to see someone enjoying my dogs," says Shirley. "Especially for the elderly and disabled, a certified therapy dog brings them comfort, quiets them and calms them. A dog is not judgmental. He gives you a kiss and shakes your hand regardless of your status or ability."


Shirley's boxers are certified by Therapy Dogs International. In addition to Greenwalt, she maintains a regular schedule at a number of schools, hospitals and nursing homes.


