Penn students experience interfaith **New Orleans**

Midway through the ten-year relationship between Catholic Charities Archdiocese of New Orleans and the University of Pennsylvania, both parties have reaped benefits. In early March, a group of 19 people involved with the Fox Fellowship program at Penn spent four days exploring the New Orleans area with an eye toward enjoying an interfaith learning experience.

Five undergraduates from Penn Hillel and five from Penn's Catholic Association, along with staff members and the five Fox Fellows currently assigned to New Orleans met with Archbishop Gregory Aymond, toured St. Louis Cathedral and Beth Israel Synagogue, rode an oyster boat in Pointe a la Hache and took a little time to explore New Orleans music and nightlife. The group attended Purim services at Shir Chadash Synagogue.

Four of the current group of five Fox Fellows assigned to Catholic Charities are rotating out of their New Orleans assignments. Nicole Dillard will begin the second year of her commitment. Erica Halpern has completed her assignment, but has chosen to remain on staff at Catholic Charities in the development office. Four new Fox Fellows will be arriving soon from the University of Pennsylvania to begin

their two-year rotations.

The ten-year commitment between Penn and Catholic Charities began shortly after Hurricane Katrina, when the university agreed to send five fellows for two-year assignments to assist Catholic Charities in its recovery work. The students live in community and experience all that New Orleans and Catholic Charities have to offer.

Halpern says her two-year stint with Catholic Charities is an experience she'll never forget. "The opportunity that Penn and Catholic Charities have given to all of the fellows is an incredible one. It allows us to live in and experience a new city, to work for an organization and work with people who truly want to help others, and it gives us the opportunity to figure out our own path in life."

Crescent House brings hope to families

A few years ago, a young woman came to Crescent House, our domestic violence healing and empowerment center. She was only 23, but had been in an abusive relationship for ten years.

The violence she survived was brutal: in addition to verbal and emotional abuse, she suffered through severe beatings, strangulation and even rape. The abuse led to clinical depression, but she was unable to afford her medication and couldn't hold onto a job.


The abuse also affected the young woman's 3 year-old son and 1 year-old daughter. Her son was hyper vigilant and was suspicious of everyone he encountered. He also had difficulty sleeping. Her daughter was often irritable and hard to comfort. Over the years, Crescent House provided counseling and group therapy for the young woman and play therapy for her children. We connected her with housing assistance, a mental health clinic for her depression, and support services including food, personal supplies and occasional direct assistance.

When this family first visited Crescent House, they were broken. Now, after more than two years, they are healthy and happy.

This family now lives in a stable and secure apartment. The young woman holds a job, which enables her to provide for her two young children. Her mental health has greatly improved, as has the wellbeing of the children. Her little boy has become an outgoing, happy boy and her daughter is learning new words every day.

This young family embodies the hope that Catholic Charities brings to the people we serve each day.

ACCESS Pregnancy & Referral Centers was also on tour in March. On March 30, the Lenten Tour for Life visited all three ACCESS locations: Metairie, Bywater and Marrero, concluding with Mass and lunch at



LaQuinta Inns & Suites recently held its annual conference in New Orleans, and to show its commitment to the City of New Orleans' plan to end homelessness, LaQuinta held the "Largest Human Mattress Domino Drop." This event, where 800 mattresses were set up to fall like dominoes, broke the record in The Guinness Book of World Records for the world's largest human mattress domino drop. After the drop, charities around the city received mattresses for clients. Catholic Charities received 162 mattresses for its programs, including Voyage House, Baronne Street Transitional Housing, Jefferson CARE Center, Hispanic Apostolate Community Services and St. Louise de Marillac Ministry.
