School Readiness

CCANO Head Start/Early Head Start defines school readiness as children being ready for school, families ready to support their children's learning, and schools ready for the children who enter their doors. School readiness for children in Head Start is measured by the skills set out in the five domains of the Head Start Early Learning Outcome Framework. We work to meet the overall goal of ensuring the school readiness and social competence of young children in-low-income families. CCANO Head Start/Early Head Start programs work from the Creative Curriculum which is aligned with Louisiana State Standards, Head Start's Early Learning Outcome Framework, CCANO Head Start's School Readiness Goals, and Teaching Strategies Gold (our ongoing assessment tool). They work to ensure that children leaving Head Start are fully equipped for kindergarten and beyond. The focus on social competence means fostering the child's every day effectiveness in dealing with his or her present environment and later responsibilities in school and life. Social competence takes into account social, emotional, physical, cognitive, math, language and literacy development of the child. We work to see that families are engaged in their children's learning and development and ready to support their child's lifelong success. Head Start recognizes that parents are their children's primary teachers, and we offer family members opportunities and support for growth and change, believing that people can identify their strengths, needs and interests and are capable of finding solutions.

Kindergarten Preparation

In addition to the skills included in the Early Learning Outcome Framework, we prepare children to transfer from Early Head Start through Head Start Pre K, Head Start, and on to kindergarten through transition activities. Listed below are the activities we complete to support kindergarten readiness.

Each center partners with local area elementary schools and invites the principal or teachers from their local school district to attend Parent Meetings. During the parent meetings they are able to share information with parents about the school, the expectations in kindergarten, and the enrollment process.

Schools partnered with this year: Kipp, Samuel Green, Lycee Francais, Akili, and Foundation Preparatory.

Family Advocates support parents with enrolling their children for Kindergarten through the Enroll Nola system.

Early Head Start and Head Start Teacher's complete a transition packet that includes development information about each child.

Classroom lesson plans include transition activities to ensure a smooth transition.

A Kindergarten Readiness Checklist is completed for all children transitioning to Kindergarten.

Each spring, students transitioning to kindergarten visit an actual kindergarten classroom. Early Head Start transitioning students visit a Pre- K Head Start classroom. This provides students an opportunity to see a classroom and building, as well as interact with students and teachers. In the 2019 -2020 school year, CCANO Head Start/ Early Head Start will improve our Transition Procedures by sponsoring a Kindergarten Fair. We will also involve the parents more by holding quarterly Parent Transition Meetings to address topics that will prepare them to support their transitioning children.

CLASS (Classroom Assessment Scoring System)

As a grantee serving preschool age children in the center-based option, all CCANO Head Start preschool classrooms were observed in the fall, winter, and spring quarters of the 2018-2019 school year using the Classroom Assessment Scoring System (CLASS). CLASS is an assessment tool that measures teacher/child interactions, as well as interactions between children. The observations were completed by the program Education Component Specialists and contracted Education Specialists from outside the organization.

- Emotional Support assesses the degree to which teachers establish and promote a positive climate in their classroom through their everyday interactions.
- Classroom Organization assesses classroom routines and procedures related to the organization and management of children's behavior, time, and attention in the classroom.
- Instructional Support assesses the ways in which teachers implement the curriculum to effectively promote cognitive and language development


Ongoing Assessment

Teaching Strategies Gold the research based tool our program uses to assess the growth of our students. We assess our students at the end of the fall, winter, and spring checkpoints. Data generated from TSG is used to guide instruction, individualize, plan professional development, and drive decisions made for the program. The graph below shows CCANO Head Start/Early Head start student's growth as a program across all domains. Scores show the percentage of students meeting/exceeding expectations based on widely-held expectations

At the national level, in 2017 - 2018, Head Start grantees received CLASS[®] reviews. Head Start Grantees must not fall below the national lowest 10%. The table below reflects the results of the reviews. The fourth column reflects the results from the program's average scores from the fall, winter, and spring quarter internal observations. CCANO's scores were higher that the lowest 10%.


Health and Nutrition


An integral component of school readiness is health because healthy children are ready to learn. From serving nutritious meals, to providing health and nutrition education, to coordinating health services, our Head Start and Early Head Start staff are dedicated to ensuring that our children are socially, emotionally, and physically prepared for their academic careers.

Nutrition. Our talented cooks have worked hard all year to provide nutritious meals and snacks for our children and staff on a daily basis. This year an average of 17,000 nutritious meals were served every month including a hot breakfast, lunch, and afternoon snack. Our Head Start children got to try exciting new foods and answer the question: "Where Does Our Food Come From?" through their nutrition education activities in the classroom.

Health Services. Children enrolled in our Head Start and Early Head Start programs receive comprehensive health screenings to identify and treat any health concerns that may hinder their ability to reach peak academic performance. Our program works closely with our families to ensure that their children have health insurance, that they are established patients at a medical or dental home where they receive continuous and ongoing health care such as preventative physical and dental exams, and immunizations. This is a collaborative effort between our parents, the Family Advocates, the Health and Nutrition Coordinator, and our local community providers and partners.

Mental Health: Family Services

The Mental Health Coordinator offers emergency counseling services to Head Start families in the event of a crisis, death, and violence. Usually after two or three counseling sessions, the family is referred to Catholic Charities Counseling Solutions or a preferred community mental health provider so that on-going counseling and support can be continued. The Head Start Mental Health Coordinator also speaks about mental health topics of interest at monthly center parent meetings upon request. CCANO continues to utilize a Support Assistance Team Meeting at each center to refer students that may need help either behaviorally or academically to the Mental Health / Disabilities Coordinator using a team approach.

Disabilities: Family Services

CCANO continues to utilize a Support Assistance Team (S.A.T.) at each center to refer students that may need help either behaviorally or academically to the Mental Health / Disabilities Coordinator using a team approach. This team consists of: Teacher, Family Advocate, Center Director, Teacher Mentor, and Mental Health and Disabilities Coordinator. Families can also refer their children whom they suspect may have a developmental delay. Once a referral(s) are made my parents, the Disabilities Coordinator will conduct a classroom observation of child.

CCANO is now holding monthly Multi-Disciplinary Team (MDT) meetings at each center. In attendance at the meetings are; the Mental Health and Disabilities Coordinator, the School Readiness Coordinators, the Health and Nutrition Coordinator, the Parent and Family Engagement Coordinator, the ERSEA Coordinator, the Center Director, and the Family Advocates.

The purpose of the MDT meeting is to ensure that any and all concerns regarding our students are addressed and closed using a team approach.

Results / recommendation are discussed confidentially at a S.A.T. meeting with parents and the Disabilities Coordinator along with the Family Advocate will then start the evaluation process with the Orleans Parish

Schools Exceptional Children Services or Easter Seals Early Steps Program. After a full evaluation has been performed, and diagnosis has been given for child, either an Individual Family Service Plan (IFSP) or Individual Educational Plan (IEP) will be formed for the child. To date for 2019 CCANO has initiated or monitored the implementation of 39 IEPs and/or IFSPs.

Parent Engagement Activities

Parents and families are supported in achieving their own goals, such as: housing stability, continued education, and financial security. Our family well-being programs support and strengthen parent-child relationships and engage families around children's learning and development.

Many parents who enroll their children in Head Start and Early Head Start also receive educational services themselves. We have assisted many of our parents in obtaining their GEDs and enrolling in college classes. Some parents also take our English as a Second Language (ESL) classes and receive guidance on the path to citizenship.

Parents also receive education about child rearing through the Positive Parenting Program - Triple P. Each family is different, so depending on individual needs, parents and other family members may also be referred to medical, social welfare or employment specialists for services.



Success Story

Mr. and Mrs. Atraga, parents of St. John the Baptist Head Start student "T" are very serious about their child's education. They are from Egypt and face the language barrier and cultural difference. However, they make sure their son attends school daily and his homework is completed and turned in on time. Mrs. Atraga expressed the desire to enroll in school for English as a Second Language and will pursue this course next school year. The mom volunteers in his class room and dad attends the parent meetings. They seek advice on parenting, discipline, and education and follow through. They are a very delightful family to work with and I expect great things in their future because of Head Start.




Middle Tennessee State University Volunteers Visit St. John the Baptist Head Start






Family Outcomes

Success Story

My name is Keshanica Andrews, and I am a 41 year old college student from New Orleans, Louisiana. I am inspired to share my own story. In 1997, I attended Delgado Community College as a first-time freshman, newly out of high school. My college experience has definitely not been what I expected. I was looking forward to going to Nursing School but at the time my mind wasn't set there. I like to enjoy life with family and friends. I felt like I wasted my first two years of college and then reality set in. I asked myself, "what did I want my life to be like?"

It was hard working a full-time job and being a full-time student. I woke up most days at 5:45am, worked an 8 hour shift at New Orleans City Hall – which was less than 10 minutes from my home- and then had to rush through traffic to my evening classes. Being a mother of two kids, working, and going to school is a challenge. That's when my college experience began.

Sometimes, I just wanted to quit my job so I can focus on my education, but how can I? I have to pay bills and support me and my family. Working so much means we are more likely to be stressed, feel disconnected from school and drop out. That's something I can relate to.

For years, I struggled financially living from pay check to pay check but I still was able to manage it and it was rough and hard. I was always on the edge of quitting school, ashamed that I could not handle school and work and being a mother more easily.


My mom always told me growing up that you are the company you keep. To a certain extent, I agreed, but I also thought that a person decides who and what they become. In my time at Delgado, I have realized that my mother was right. When you are surrounded by excellence, it challenges you to also be excellent, but ultimately the decision to be excellent is yours. I have done and achieved more in my 4 years at Delgado than I ever imagined I would. I attribute my success to the encouragement and support not only of my professors and mentors, but also my peers. More time than not it was my family and friends that convinced me that I could achieve something when I was skeptical of my own ability.

As I enter my fourth and final year of college, I have begun to experience many "last moments". In a few weeks alone, I experienced my last time walking on campus, my last first day of my undergraduate career and my last time registering for courses.

Finally, May 15, 2018 was the happiest day of my life in that I accomplished what I have worked so hard for. The struggle was over for that chapter. I received my degree. Non-Federal Match

This standard requires that federal financial assistance will not exceed 80% of the approved total program costs. Catholic Charities Archdioces of New Orleans Head Start Program is required to contribute 20% as non-Federal match each budget period.
