## Valarie Maronge

hank you for listening to me!" Valarie Maronge, Administrative Coordinator for the Northshore office of Catholic Charities Archdiocese of New Orleans, hears this often. As the primary triage contact for assistance, Valarie listens and evaluates what program can best accommodate the need of the individual who is calling or emailing. "I cannot believe you are still on the phone with me!" insisted a caller who had spent nearly an hour explaining why she was having trouble paying her rent and mentioned she truly "felt heard" by Valarie.

In August 2022, Valarie started with CCANO at the front desk in our Northshore office. This office houses the Northshore branches of CCANO's Counseling Solutions Program, Spirit of Hope, Bethlehem Housing and Cornerstone Builders.

Having come from the medical field, Valarie has the skills required to listen and screen callers to assign them to the appropriate case manager who can then assist the individual with a plan of action. "I am very passionate about helping the community and hearing each

individual story." Valarie states, "I can listen. I cannot give advice but I can give resources."

Valarie sees a path within CCANO to take on more administrative duties. # Student Volunteers Make An Impact

group of ten Rice University students, visiting New Orleans through the Alternative Spring Break (ASB) program offered by the Center for Civic Leadership, decided to volunteer with Catholic Charities Archdiocese of New Orleans this year. ASB is a nationwide program that provides college students the opportunity to work on specific service-oriented projects with several community-based organizations over the course of spring break. The students worked with CCANO's clients to navigate the bus system here in the greater New Orleans area.

Denise Maldonado explained, "Our intention was to help aid and promote the missions of our community partners by providing trauma-informed care, empathetic understanding, and personal insights to the service work opportunities we had during our visit to New Orleans. Thank you for your interest in featuring our group — it truly means a lot to us, and we greatly appreciate the opportunity to continue our collaboration with Catholic Charities."

Cindy Self, Volunteer Director for Catholic Charities said, "It was a lot of fun getting to know them individually during the onboarding process and during their time with us. While helping our clients navigate public transportation, I witnessed the CCANO mission in action as they walked beside the most vulnerable, working to meet their needs. The students found ways to communicate with our clients, proved that laughter has no language barrier, and made an impact in the lives of our clients and employees alike."

This summer is a great opportunity for high school students that need service hours to volunteer with CCANO. SERVE which stands for "Students Engaging in Reflective Volunteer Services" has been working with students since 2009. This year, the week of June 5th-9th we will be at Food for Seniors in Harvey, which is both a warehouse and a distribution center. Students will help pack boxes of food and possibly assist with loading the boxes into our participants' vehicles. Then in July we will have two weeks open at PACE, Catholic Charities Program of All Inclusive Care for the Elderly, which is in the Bywater. Students can choose between the weeks of July 10th-14th or July 17th-21st and will interact directly with our seniors in the adult day center. SERVE concludes with a day of reflection on July 25th at the CYO office in New Orleans.
